
Mike lives in the Dallas, TX, area with his wife, Dorinda, daughter, Hannah, and their standard poodle, Princess.



An Interview with the author

Q. What inspired you to write Hannah Goodheart and the Guardian of Time?

A. Writing is one of my creative outlets. I love to tell stories—always have. It was late 2015 and I got excited about a short story contest that came up. I poured everything into it. A friend, who edited my first draft, boosted my confidence by saying it was a legitimately well told story. The real inspiration, however, came one evening as I was getting ready to submit the manuscript. My daughter, Hannah, had come into my studio to hear me read. She was genuinely caught up in it and commented that she really loved seeing the joy I had telling this story. I'll never forget how she came over, kissed my cheek and asked me to promise, no matter what happened with this short story, I would continue writing. How do you say "no" to that? A couple days later I wrote the first sentences of what became Hannah Goodheart and the Guardian of Time.

Q. Where did the idea come from for this book?


A. I was, I think, in the fifth grade, when a teacher put a copy of Madeline L'Engle's "A Wrinkle in Time" in my hands. I grew up watching Star Trek on television and have been a huge fan since I was a child in the early 70's. The thing that really draws me into Star Trek, or something like Tolkien's Lord of the Rings is the way a good story can transport you out of our world and into another while tackling real life problems. Naturally, I want to tell stories that forces the reader to think – to see our world or the human condition from a new perspective. For Hannah Goodheart, I wanted to write a story for my daughter that said character counts. It's about taking a risk and accepting responsibility for a problem, even if it isn't necessarily *your* problem. It's full of history and science. It deals with hope and despair, myth versus truth, and the importance of life's first friendships. I drew a lot of inspiration from classic literature as well.

Q. Who is your target reader?

A. Hannah Goodheart and the Guardian of Time is a Young Adult Science Fiction/Fantasy novel, but it has an innocence to it, so younger readers can certainly read up to it. It's a great family friendly read, for sure. One reviewer likened it to something akin to Secret Garden meets The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe. Others have compared it to the Percy Jackson series – Percy Jackson meets Quantum Leap; I think it was.

Q. You mentioned L'Engle and Tolkien. Who are your biggest influences as a writer?

A. Certainly those two. C.S. Lewis has had a profound influence on me. I'd be remiss if I didn't mention Asimov, Bradberry, Arthur C. Clark, and classics like Wells and Verne. I love the classics. As I've gotten older, I'm rediscovering the likes of Dante, Hesiod, and Homer as well. Contemporary favorites are Rick Riordan, Richard Paul Evans, and Anthony Horowitz.
